1 Welcome, Thanks, Apologies and Introductions

Judith McClure welcomed Members of the SCEN Advisory Council, noted apologies. There were then helpful introductions around the table.

2 Report from SCEN

2 (a) DRAFT Annual Report and Accounts of the Trustees of SCEN in its first year, 3 December 2015 – 31 December 2016

Judith McClure said the Trustees of SCEN, at their Meeting on 27 April 2017, had reviewed their draft Annual Report and Accounts for SCEN's first year as a charity regulated by OSCR, SCIO SC046171. They were proud of what was being achieved and the documents would be submitted to OSCR, with the Annual Report, by September 2017, after the Report of the Independent Examiner had been received.

Judith McClure circulated the Draft Annual Report.

2 (b) Meeting of the SCEN Youth Committee, 26 April 2017

Judith McClure reported on a lively Meeting of the SCEN Youth Committee, with articulate and committed contributions from SCEN Ambassadors.

3 SCEN Events, Summer and Autumn 2017

Judith McClure circulated the list of SCEN Events for the Summer and Autumn Terms 2017.

3 (a) Launch of New Programme for SCEN Ambassadors

Rosemary Mitchell, Convener of SCEN Ambassadors, spoke of the new Programme and Structure of SCEN Ambassadors and the guidelines for the Role of Mentor Teachers. She circulated the relevant document and said that it was being analysed by SCEN groups. The new Programme and Structure would be launched at the Sixth SCEN China Youth Summit on 3 November 2017.

3 (b) Report on the Chinese Teaching Club

Members spoke appreciatively of the work of the collaborative Chinese Teaching Club, co-convened by Dr Zhu Zhu and Lynnette Martin.

4 <u>SCEN Learning of Chinese Programme in East Lothian</u>

Simon Macaulay spoke of encouraging developments in the Learning of Chinese Programme in East Lothian. He had great hopes of the continuation of the work of leading Primary Schools into secondary education in East Lothian, and he would report further on that when decisions had been taken.

4(a) Partnership with Eden English Language School, Nanning

Judith McClure reported the close links being developed with Ed Hoffie and the Eden English Language School, Nanning. These may well lead to further connections with the Education Department of Nanning Provincial Government.

5 Progress with the Mapping Chinese Survey

Judith McClure reported on progress with the SCEN and Confucius Institute for Scotland Mapping Chinese survey. The 2,700 Head Teachers of all schools in Scotland (local authority, independent, Chinese Community, special) had been invited to complete a short survey detailing their practice in the teaching and learning of Chinese and about China, and their collaborations locally, nationally and internationally. Much remained to be done a further report would be made at the next Meeting of the Advisory Council.
